1937



Howard Adler opens Adler Display

Howard Adler opens Adler Display in the attic of his mother's clothing store on Preston Street, beginning with hand lettering signs.

1958



Nipper, the RCA Mascot

Nipper, the RCA Mascot, is created out of papier-mâché to sit on the roof of the RCA distributor's building in downtown Baltimore.

1963



Children's Zoo at Druid Hill Park

Children's Zoo at Druid Hill Park opens featuring Noah's Ark, Mouse House, a swinging bridge, and more.

1994



Fox at Fox Chevrolet in Timonium

Adler Display builds Fox's mascot out of papier-mâché and fiber glass. A total of four foxes were created for dealerships in Maryland including Timonium, Social Security, Ellicott City, and Laurel.

2000



Adler Display Moves to Windsor Mill

The company moves to a more modern 17,000-square-foot facility that contains a woodworking shop, display showroom, graphics and printing space, and more. Today's equipment includes CNC machinery and advanced direct-to-media printers.

Barbara and Jenna Adler Join the Business

The family business expands. Jenna joins Adler Display in Marketing and Sales, while Barbara works in Accounting.

Shock Trauma Interactive Donor Recognition Display

The museum in downtown Baltimore consists of graphics, artifacts, and interactive displays that tell the story of Mary Pickersgill, the maker of the Star Spangled Banner flag that was hoisted over Fort McHenry during the Battle of Baltimore in the War of 1812.



Washington Capitals, Wizards, & Valor Displays at Verizon Center

2015

Several displays are installed for the Washington Capitals, Wizards, & Valor. One display for the Caps houses hats to recognize players' hat tricks, while the Washington Wizards' display features retired basketball player and long-standing announcer, Phil Chenier.



Sinai Hospital's Organ Donor Display

Sinai Hospital's Donor Display honors generous organ and tissue donors by sharing their stories and adding their names to a colorful memorial wall. The interactive touch-screen also features technology allowing people to scan their licenses to sign up as donors.
